Kaya parents, carers and school community,

Winterfold Primary School has been selected as one of three national finalists in the school category of this years Narragunnawali Awards which celebrates outstanding commitments to reconciliation in education.

Next Wednesday, 16 August, we have an opportunity to share with the judging panel just how committed we are to moving towards cultural responsiveness as a school and community. As part of our visit we have a morning tea planned and everyone is invited! A strong attendance will be one way to demonstrate your support of the work we have and continue to do in this space.

I have invited Mr Berry out of retirement and Ms Radford, our Principal for Term 1, to be part of the celebrations. It will be wonderful to see Mr Berry and Ms Radford again.

Please ensure the media consent form is completed and returned to school asap, copy also attached to newsletter email or available at the front office.

The recognition as a finalist for this award presents a good opportunity for further conversations with your children about reconciliation and what it means to them. As wonderful as the award would be, the greatest importance is always about the conversations and actions we take towards reconciliation. There is still a lot of work to be done; voices to be heard and changes to be had for a better, fairer future.

Next week we celebrate Science Week and are very thankful to Ms Easterbrook who has been working hard to ensure the week is jam packed with numerous science experiments, incursions and STEM challenges for the whole school. Science inspires curiosity, improves cognitive ability and problem solving and develops collaboration and communication skills. It is going to be a great week and we cannot wait to see all the Science Challenge submissions.

Supporting your child at school.

At Winterfold Primary School we consider parents as partners in their child's education. When we work in collaboration, we understand how best to support the needs of your child, maximise learning opportunities and ensure success. This may involve meeting with classroom teachers, deputy principals or at times the principal. This will depend on the nature of the concern or need of support.

<u>Parent Meeting</u> – We always encourage parents to reach out to classroom teachers in the first instance if there are any concerns. Teachers work the closest with your child, making them best positioned to provide the support needed. To enable enough time to address any issues we suggest making an appointment either during their DOTT (duties other than teaching) time or before or after school.

Depending on the nature of the meeting it may be necessary to have a follow up review meeting to check back in, particularly if there are planned actions. This can be negotiated with the classroom teacher. For some, meetings might be more regular to discuss and review documented plans like Behaviour Support Plans, Individual Education Plans, Safety or Risk Management Plans

<u>Deputy Principal</u> – There may be occasions when further support is needed. If you feel that you require additional support or have an issue you feel has not been resolved to your satisfaction, please contact the administration and book a time with one of our deputy principals. Both Kylie Bonser and Leanne Hill are very experienced school leaders and will work closely with you to resolve any issues in a timely manner. This may include involving additional supports like our School Psychologist, our Chaplain or external service providers. Often issues at this level are shared with the principal although managed by a deputy.

<u>Principal</u> – Concerns or issues escalated to the principal are often those that have not been resolved at other levels or are more complex in nature.

August and September
Second Rains—Warming Up
The Season of Conception



We are currently in the Noongar season of *Djilba*. The second rains are helping to fill the rivers and lakes. The nights are cold, but the days are becoming longer and warmer. Traditionally this was the time that Noongar family groups joined together for collective hunting and gathering. They dug up native potatoes (djok) from beneath the Wandoo trees and gathered roots. They also hunted emu (wetj), kangaroo (yongka), bandicoot (kwenda) and possum (koomool) for food. The black wattle is in full bloom during *Djilba* providing a good source of witchetty grubs (bardi). The ripe seeds from this plant could be eaten raw or ground into flour and used for damper.
